

They join the ranks of the **640** scholars, who graduated from Ruwwad since its establishment in 2005.




2016 Summer and Winter Camps "How the World Functions"

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






2016 Summer Camp in Tafileh

With the participation of 50 children and 30 youth scholars, the theme of the Tafileh Summer Camp was the “Elements of Nature”, how they interrelate and the effect humans have on these elements. Throughout the camp, the emphasis was on human choices and how they affect the environment. The camp focused on the use of creative thinking, listening, creative self-expression, cooperation, team work and resilience.

“For Your Sake” Campaign

Marking the local community’s success in protecting children from physical and verbal violence in 12 schools in East Amman, the “For Your Sake Campaign”, this year, won 48 court cases defending children who were victims of violence in the schools of Jabal Al Natheef and the surrounding areas.

Mothers overcame their misgivings and started to acknowledge the value of emboldening their children, creating a safe environment for them and respecting their dignity.





Partnerships and Services

- In cooperation with the Sana Foundation, **14** mothers of children with disabilities benefited from awareness sessions throughout the year.
- In partnership with the Justice Center for Legal Aid, **45** cases were taken to court and **132** consultations were given.
- **20** employment opportunities were found in cooperation with the Ministry of Labor.
- **63** students benefited from career counseling in two schools.
