



Impact Statement



Jordan

Since the establishment of Ruwwad in 2005, Ruwwad enabled a total of **1244** in Jordan, in East Amman/Jabal Al Natheef, Tafileh and Al Beidha

In Ruwwad Jordan, 213 youth throughout 2019 operated safe spaces in three community centers in East Amman/Jabal Al Natheef, Al Tafileh and Al Beidha, to enhance the education and development of 1257 children and 210 adolescents. Moreover, and through the 21,350 hours of community service these youth contributed; 316 families benefited from the Community Support Program.



YOUTH SPEND 1 YEAR IN EACH COMMUNITY SERVICE PROGRAM AS FOLLOWS:

Recycling day

team building and exploring youth civic engagement and youth motivation, orientation on program framework and methodologies, defining of roles and responsibilities and setting learning goals Building youth's work plans

On site orientation

2 to 3 months of orientation meetings on programs specific knowledge, skills and processes (inquiry based learning, working with adolescents, social work ethics, child literacy, IT support skills etc)

Community service

Youth build knowledge and skills in time management, event management, planning and reflection, data entry, evaluation, facilitation, documentation

Learning papers

Each program conduct at least 5 learning circles a year on topics related to it (developmental stages of children, emotional intelligence, parenting styles, child protection policy, poverty etc)

End of community service year celebration

Programs celebrate the achievements of youth during the volunteering period and showcase the impact, volunteers receive volunteering certificates

DURING THE ONE YEAR OF VOLUNTEERING, COMMUNITY SERVICE IS FOLLOWED UP ON AS FOLLOWS:

Weekly planning and reflection meetings in programs for the weekly community service Periodic discussion groups with volunteers on program activities Semesterly evaluation of overall commitment by youth program Annual reflection meetings with each program's volunteers by youth program



COMMUNITY SERVICE FOLLOW-UP 2020

FOR 2020, THE FOLLOWING WILL BE IMPLEMENTED TO FOLLOW UP ON YOUTH COMMUNITY SERVICE:

program officers conduct one-on-ones with each volunteer every quarter to discuss learning, challenges and recommendations.

Monthly meeting between program officers and operational manager and program coordinators will be used to monitor youth community service and learning journeys.

youth program

conduct one-on-ones with all scholars once
every year to discuss overall journey and
opportunities to enrich it.

Each scholar receives a monthly report on overall commitment to community service hours and norms and commitment to enrichment program activities as a feedback mechanism.





Partnership with local community









- 56 families from Ruwwad's immediate neighbourhood were visited in 2019 to map their needs and the services they received from Ruwwad.
- A community meeting was held with **50** members from the community (schools, ministries, NGOs, healthy and security centers, local council) to showcase Ruwwad's achievements and receive their recommendations.
- 400 children were outreach in schools in the neighborhood to participate in "ما يستحق الحياة conference.
- Neighborhood stakeholders were mapped in a conflict resolution workshop conducted in partnership with GIZ, and conflicts with problematic individuals were identified and action-planned to address them.










- Development of a training manual for enhancing capacities of Community Facilitators.







List of Projects in 2019











- Rawabet: Informs the design of youth-led initiatives under the youth program, needs to adapt to a neighborhood-centric approach. Enabled 30 youth in East Amman among which are 18 Ruwwad scholars.
- LO: Supports our child program as an interventive method to bring back children to schools, and it intersects with community support program through providing vocational training opportunities to parents. Employed Seba one of our graduates, engaged government, NGO and the chamber of commerce.
- CITI provided internships to 2 of our scholars, not cost efficient and placement in private sector requires Ehigh cost.
- PLAN: mployed 4 youth to support recruitment and follow up with the community, will help us set up the business incubator for East Amman.
- ASK: Test our psychosocial support module with Syrian refugees. Will enable Syrian scholars at Ruwwad.
- **Open Society:** Employed 15 on part time and full-time basis, 7 of which are youth graduates and the rest are women champions of our campaigns.
- Music Track: Enables the foundation of a community music school.



- 57 youth (university graduates) were provided with Employability Skills Training for the ICT sector companies.
- Of the **57** beneficiaries, **36** were females and **21** were males, of the age group (22-30).
- 14 youth beneficiaries (11 females and 3 males) were engaged in an internship program for up to 6 months in collaboration with 10 ICT companies



- 25 participants, 23 from Jordan and 2 from Egypt, 50% of them women and 10% people living with disability attended the national training held in the Dead Sea in January.
- Based on the national training, 2 initiatives were implemented:
 - Initiative One: You are still too young بعدك صغيرة
 - محتك أهم Initiative two: Your health is much important صحتك أهم



- 13 families were referred to Siraj campaign for direct benefit
- 242 families benefit from awareness sessions
- 15 children benefited from psychosocial support
- 126 children benefit from Ruwwad programs and activities
- Enroll 93 working and drop out children in schools through outreach campaign and advocacy with children and their families
- 44 children, community members and civil society and government representatives were interviewed for the documentation process of Ruwwad and ILO model

A tool was developed to evaluate Ruwwad's team motivation and dynamics on the main social and emotional factors that influence the brain:

Growth Mindset: The degree to which team member seeks learning opportunities actively, asks and gives feedback, learns from mistakes and shares them openly, and gets out of their comfort zone.

Status: The degree to which team member feels their status in their subject of expertise is being appreciated.

Certainty: To what degree does the team member feel they have clear roles and responsibilities and learning goals, and communication with them is transparent and clear.

Autonomy: The degree to which team member feels they are part of the decision-making process, and the extent to which they believe that students have intrinsic motivation to learn.

Relatedness: The degree to which team member feels they belong to the group in terms of collaboration and cultural values.

Fairness: The degree to which the team members feels the environment is inclusive, nonjudgmental, impartial and managers don't practice favouritism.

Challenge: The degree to which the job challenges current knowledge and skills and provide personal and career growth opportunities.

Acknowledgement: Team member feels their effort is acknowledged through feedback and mentoring, and their concerns and recommendations are listened to by higher management.

Ethics: Confidentiality, conflict of interest, bullying, gossip, transparency, openness to diversity, and how consistent are the ethical systems of employees with the overall organizational culture.
